Hope you all have enjoyed your much needed summer break!

Richard Baker and team are already putting together a great program for the joint Congress with NHSBT in sunny Brighton! In addition, this autumn we have a BTS two-day meeting at the Fetal Medicine Centre, King's College Hospital, London.

The first day is a Monothematic day on 'Ageing and Transplantation' where we would hope to discuss clinical issues surrounding our aging donor and recipient population and understanding the research aspects of 'senescence'.

The second day is co-badged with the International Living Donor Liver Transplant Group (iLDLTG) to host the 'International Living Donor Liver Transplant (LDLT) UK Symposium'. This is in keeping with the national drive from NHSBT to promote living liver donation, particularly 'adult to adult' LDLT that has been lacking in the UK. Included in the program there is a 'Mentor and Mentee' session for young surgeons wishing to pursue training in LDLT and there will also be an opportunity to do this by applying through the BTS bursary scheme.

The details of the programme are on the BTS website, and we have a got together a very good national and international faculty for the two days. Below is the link for the programme and registration.

In addition, we are planning to hold both Postgraduate and Nursing and AHP Masterclasses on the Tuesday before Congress. 2025 will once again see a joint congress with NHSBT and we look forward to welcoming members of the donation community. The working theme of the Congress is "Nurturing Interdependency" which reflects our joint sense of purpose across the whole transplantation pathway. We will also be holding novel sessions addressing:

We are also honoured to be addressed by one of our transplant surgical colleagues, Mr Zubir Ahmed, who has recently been elected as an MP and is working at the heart of the new government.

We are aware that conferences can take a heavy toll on resources and the environment, often generating significant waste. It is especially fitting that this conference is in Brighton, which has been represented by a Green party MP since 2010, and we remain committed to making the conference as sustainable as possible. We will maintain the measures introduced last year while looking to extend our commitments. For example, the default option at our annual dinner will be vegetarian (an alternative option will be available) and we have worked closely with venues to minimise our carbon footprint. We will again be offsetting so that the conference is carbon neutral. For those wishing a eco-friendly travel option we will also be organising a BTS London to Brighton cycle ride on Monday 10th March and more details will follow.

Following on from the success of last year's "Diversity in Transplantation" session which celebrated the nature of our workforce, we are determined to continue with an ongoing EDI programme under the stewardship of our co-opted representative, Professor Adnan Sharif. It has been a particularly poignant twelve months for the Transplant Community with the publication of the RCS report on "Sexual Misconduct in Surgery" and a further high-profile case this year. The executive feel that this issue needs to be addressed head on, and we will be holding a plenary session on "Sexual Safety in the NHS Workplace". We remain totally committed to ensure that the BTS is an all-inclusive society that deplores abuse or intolerance in any shape or form.

Finally on a lighter note we hope that as many of you as possible will join us at the Hilton HoeDown on Thursday night for some line dancing and Country and Western Music. There will once again be a prize for the best dressed!

I look forward to sharing the full programme with you in the next few weeks but in the meantime, I hope you enjoy the Autumn!

Dr Ahmed Ahmed, Consultant Nephrologist at St. James's University Hospital in Leeds

Born and raised in Sudan, my passion for solving puzzles led me to a pivotal choice: medicine over music. While I loved the melodies, the complexities of the human body captured my imagination and became my next big milestone. This passion carried me to the UK, where I eventually pursued further training in nephrology, diving deep into the intricacies of kidney health.

As I honed my skills in nephrology, my fascination with transplantation blossomed, particularly the immunological marvels that dictate success or failure in this field. It was a thrilling blend of science and humanity that fuelled my ambition to make a difference. I soon recognised that transplantation is not just about organs; it's about people, and addressing health inequalities became a driving force in my career.

Through an incredible opportunity, I embarked on research that linked transplantation with health equity, aiming to shed light on disparities in access to care. BTS provided a fantastic platform for me to share my work with an inspiring network of colleagues from the UK and beyond.
